Remembering Chip Morgan

Walter Edward "Chip" Morgan's life was celebrated on Saturday, March 29, 2025 at St. Paul's Ivy Church in Charlottesville. He was remembered as a relentless advocate for the flora and biodiversity of central Virginia as a founder of the Rockfish Valley Foundation and early supporter of the Wintergreen Nature Foundation in addition to the Foundation of the Flora of Virginia Project.

Chip's impact on the Flora was profound. He was one of 40 botanists convened to explore the creation of a *Flora of Virginia* in 2001, was elected

our first board vice president, and served from 2001 until the App launched in 2017. Flora of Virginia Project founder and board president, Chris Ludwig, remembers:



On the Move



Flora of Virginia data moving to new home

The Flora database is a **MASSIVE** Excel spreadsheet – more than 630,000 cells arranged in 180 columns and more than 3,500 rows – and all updates and changes are executed manually. One brilliant person who retired from the board after more than 20 years of service managed this incredibly time-consuming process. While other board members have stepped in, it is cumbersome, tedious, and rife with opportunities to make errors.

With a generous grant awarded by the Virginia Environmental Endowment (VEE) the work has begun. To date, we have completed a feasibility study and contracted with the North Carolina Botanical Garden, home of our partners at the Flora of the Southeastern US (FSUS) to build and host a custom database. The first phase -- moving the dichotomous keys -- kicked off in January.

Moving to an institutional platform means we can:

- Make edits and approve updates using functionality, automation and menu commands designed explicitly for the Flora.
- Secure our data against viruses, software obsolescence and human error.
- Remove dependence on individuals to execute, review and approve all manner of edits.
- Seamlessly share data with our partners as appropriate.

This project will ensure that the Flora of Virginia is sustainable, so this incredible resource can support conservation work well into the future.
