Looking Back, Moving Forward

The Flora of Virginia Project has achieved so much since its inception in 2001. The objective of the volunteer board of directors was clear – produce a modern Flora of Virginia honoring the original, published in 1739 by John Clayton. That simple goal took ten years to accomplish, with the publication of the Flora of Virginia in 2012. Guided by board president Chris Ludwig, founding board member Marion Lobstein, and Executive Director Bland Crowder, the book includes approximately 3,200 taxa in 200 families and features 1,400 captioned, scaled, and botanically accurate illustrations. **Chris retires this summer, learn how we are celebrating his decades of service.**

Almost immediately, the need for <u>an app version of the Flora</u> became apparent. The ability to carry the more than 1,500 pages of data and content in your pocket would be transformational, and so the next phase began. The app launched in September 2017 and despite COVID a significant update was completed in 2020. The founding members passed the baton to the new team in 2021 to steward the evolution of the project.

The primary objective will always be to keep the data up to date and accurate, and of value to ecology professionals and enthusiasts alike. We are currently working to integrate Natural Communities data and information about native plant communities and look forward to sharing more ecological information in future editions. Florascope will be published bi-monthly, providing updates on app enhancements, and information and education about important work to protect and restore Virginia's native flora.
